

ROBERT CHAFE

is a St. John's based playwright whose work has been seen across Canada, the UK, and Australia. He is the author of eighteen stage scripts and co-author of another ten. He is Artistic Director and playwright for Artistic Fraud of Newfoundland.

Two of his plays (Tempting Providence and Butler's Marsh) were shortlisted for the Governor General's Award for Drama. His play Afterimage won the award in 2010. Tempting Providence, directed by Jillian Keiley and produced by Theatre Newfoundland Labrador premiered in the summer of 2002 in Cow Head, Newfoundland and went on to tour extensively throughout North America, Europe and Australia.

His work, Oil and Water, premiered in St. John's in a sold out run in February 2011, and has toured nationally, which included the National Arts Centre in 2014.

Between Breaths currently on tour, follows the story of Dr. Jon Lien, an animal behaviourist at Newfoundland's Memorial University who saved over 500 whales from fishing nets.

He has been a guest instructor at Memorial University of Newfoundland, Sir Wilfred Grenfell College, and the National Theatre School of Canada. His first book of short fiction, *Two-Man Tent*, was released in 2016.

DAVID BLACKWOOD

is one of Canada's most respected visual storytellers. His narrative work reflects the legend, toughness and landscape of Newfoundland. Born in 1941 in the outport community of Wesleyville to a family with a long seafaring history, he was awarded a Government of Newfoundland Centennial scholarship to study at the Ontario College of Art. By the age of twenty-three one of his etchings had been purchased by the National Gallery of Canada. Blackwood's work may be found in virtually every major public gallery and corporate art collection in Canada, as well as in major private and public collections around the world, including the collection of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and the Uffizi Gallery in Florence, Italy. Blackwood's work has been exhibited nationally and internationally with over 90 solo shows.

He has been the subject of two major retrospective exhibitions and the National Film Board's 1974 Academy-Award nominated documentary film BLACKWOOD.

In 2000, the Art Gallery of Ontario announced the creation of the Blackwood Research Centre within the Marvin Gelber Print and Drawing Centre. In 1992 the Blackwood Gallery, named in his honour, was officially opened at the Erindale campus, now known as The University of Toronto in Mississauga.

Blackwood was awarded the Order of Canada in recognition of his ongoing and important contributions to the cultural life and heritage of our country, a decade later, he was awarded the Order of Ontario.

David Blackwood currently lives and works in Port Hope, Ontario, and maintains a studio in Wesleyville, Newfoundland.
